Los Peñasquitos Adobe County Park is Site of Next CoH Board Meeting, 10a.m., *This Sat.*, May 19

The adobe at Los Peñasquitos Adobe County Park (see photo, above) will be the location of the next board meeting of the Congress of History, *this* Saturday, May 19 at 10 a.m., located in the Los Peñasquitos Canyon Preserve, 12122 Canyonside Park Dr., San Diego 92129 (off Black Mountain Rd.), at the end of the long Canyonside Park driveway, past the youth ball fields. Park in the gravel, near the barn (flat walking shoes are recommended). Everyone is welcome to attend; bring a friend!

Following the meeting, a guided tour will be offered of the historic adobe museum and the surrounding grounds. The area has archeological sites, with artifacts found showing indigenous people living here for over 6,000 years. You're also welcome to attend the tour.

History of Rancho de los Peñasquitos

The original Rancho Santa Maria de los Peñasquitos was given 1823 to Francisco María Ruiz. The name means "Saint Mary of the Little Cliffs."

Los Peñasquitos Adobe County Park is Site of Next CoH Meeting, at 10 a.m., Sat., May 19

The total rancho encompassed the present-day communities of Mira Mesa, Carmel Valley, and Rancho Peñasquitos in northern San Diego city, and ranged inland from the bluffs of the Torrey Pines State Natural Preserve. It was the first Mexican land grant in present-day San Diego County.

Francisco Ruiz built an adobe home on the rancho. In 1837 Ruiz sold his ranch to Francisco María Alvarado – a grandnephew. After Ruiz died in 1839, Alvarado moved to the ranch, and lived in the adobe home that had been built by Ruiz.

Alvarado married Tomasa Pico (1801 - 1876), and they gave the property to their daughter Maria Estéfana Alvarado (1840 - 1926) when she married Captain George Alonzo Johnson (1823 - 1903) in 1859. Capt. Johnson had inherited the ranch by the time the U.S. government granted a patent to the land in 1876.

From the 1840s, the rancho was also a way-station on the wagon road to Warner's Ranch from San Diego via San Pasqual and the Santa Ysabel Asistencia. From 1857 to 1860 the rancho was a way-station on that road for the coaches of the San Antonio-San Diego Mail Line on the 125 mile route between San Diego and Carrizo Creek Station via the Warner's Ranch road, and the Southern Emigrant Trail. Passengers were given meals here, served by the lady of the house. Rancho Peñasquitos was 20 miles from San Diego and 16 miles from the next station at San Pasqual.

Capt. Johnson sold the rancho in 1880 to Colonel Jacob Shell Taylor, founder of Del Mar. Charles F. Mohnike owned the ranch in 1910. In 1921 George Sawday and Oliver Sexon bought the ranch and stocked it with cattle. Real estate developer Irvin J. Kahn bought Rancho Peñasquitos in 1962.

The Adobe House Museum is usually open to the public from 9:30 a.m. to 4 p.m., Friday through Tuesday. The San Diego County Parks & Recreation department offers tours on weekends. For more information call the park at (858) 484-7504.

The SDHC, and other Balboa Park museums, are moving beyond hands-on exhibits to visually draw visitors into smaller spaces that are packed with artifacts and information, delivered in interesting ways. Many of *your* organizations are doing similar things in their exhibit spaces. ...

On a recent trip to Baja Calif., Mexico, with CAREM of Tecate (a CoH organizational member), I visited the new Caracol Museum in Ensenada, which has an environmental theme. Students of all ages (and non-students) are guided though exhibits to experience the current and future effects of changes in the earth's climate. We were amazed at what had been accomplished with a low budget.

We also visited the site of Mission San Vicente Ferrer (1780) and Mission Santo Domingo (1775), which is still in use. Both missions were founded by the Dominicans. . . .

Congratulations to CoH member Susan Bugbee who this year is receiving SOHO's top honor, the Preservationist of the Year Award. Historical Resources Board and the City Council approved the district!) We're *so* pleased for Susan, who was a speaker at our 2014 Conference.

After a long absence, I'm excited to once again welcome the Congress of History Board Meeting to the Los Peñasquitos Adobe Ranch House, where I'm a docent. Our next CoH meeting will be held there *THIS* Saturday, May 19. Some walls and foundations of this historic adobe date from 1822-23. One of the original, two small adobes was incorporated into a larger adobe.

Following the meeting, join us as we tour the adobe and grounds with a knowledgeable, longtime docent. You will be amazed at this San Diego County Parks and Recreation Department's historic site. . . .

CoH Board votes to Distribute Mainly Online, Electronic Copies of Adelante

With the start of our new membership year on July 1, 2018, the following edition of *Adelante* (July/August 2018) will begin a new era for our cherished Congress of History newsletter.

In February 2018 the Board voted to discontinue the hard-copy version of our newsletter. However, we also voted **not** to immediately abandon our dear members who do not have access to computers. Those members will be provided with paper copies through June 2020. (To receive electronic copies of *Adelante*, please send us your e-mail addresses, if you have not already done so.)

Members who have already paid an additional fee for hard copies will be provided those hard copies for the number of years for which they have already paid, up through the membership year ending in June 2020 (any mailing fee payments already made <u>beyond that date</u> will be returned as a refund, if requested).

The newsletter topic has been discussed at length for many years. In fact, the discussion has involved different CoH Boards. Several years ago the Board voted to charge a small mailing fee, in addition to membership, for paper copies. The amount of the fee has been increased from time to time.

In November 2017 the discussion involved not only the financial cost of mailing the paper copies of the *Adelante*, but we also considered the labor and time involved in preparing and mailing the hard copies.

The Congress of History has been blessed by the willingness of Helen and Andrew Halmay to volunteer hours and hours of their time to have copies printed, to tape the edges of the newsletters, to purchase and affix postage, to print and affix mailing address labels, and to deliver the completed hard-copy *Adelantes* to the US Post Office, all while on a deadline. Those free hours add up to days, weeks, and months — for over 20 years!

Looking toward the distant future, when there will be a new newsletter editor, the Board realized that none of the rest of us would be willing to commit that much labor and time into providing paper copies of the *Adelante*.

Today, most other organizations provide only electronic newsletters. When this first happened to me, it took me awhile to become accustomed to reading the articles without actually touching paper.

What I have found, over time, is that I usually sit down and read the entire newsletter in one or two sittings. I can reference information at any time. I can also print copies of just the pages that I need.

While some of you will not be happy with this decision, I think you *will* enjoy the full-color, that is so easy to provide online and so expensive to provide for paper copies.

We look forward to future journeys into the past with the Congress of History newsletter, the *Adelante*.

San Dieguito Heritage Ranch offers its Annual Lima Bean Cook-Off to be held *THIS* Sat., May 19

"Heritage Ranch," home of the San Dieguito Heritage Museum, will host its 9th Annual Lima Bean Cook-Off and Concert – *Lima Beans, Beer and Horseshoes* – *THIS* Saturday, May 19, from 12 p.m. to 4 p.m. at the ranch in Encinitas (see the address at the end of the article).

"Lured west by the claims of real estate pitchmen that our area had a wonderful farming climate, early settlers found little water and arid soil. Only lima beans, a dry season crop, would prosper with just the spring rains and the nightly ocean fog for nourishment," Barbara Grice, Heritage Ranch museum director. "Unappetizing as lima beans might have seemed, they were the first crop planted when Encinitas was being settled in the late 1800s, and were the foundation of our beautiful city today. Not as glamorous as garlic, artichokes or flowers, limas were Encinitas' claim to fame for many years, from the 1880's to the 1940's.

"Little was it realized, in those days, that nearly 130 years later, we would be celebrating this lowly bean with annual Lima Bean Cook-Offs events! Lima Bean ice cream, cake, cookies, dips and many other exciting dishes have been created for previous contests – *nothing* like your mama's lima beans!"

This year, the San Dieguito Heritage Ranch has been

looking for creative Amateur, Professional and Kid chefs to compete in their Lima Bean Cookoff. Celebrity judges will determine awards in each division for each category and for the Best Vegetarian Dish. A "People's Choice" award will be selected in each division by the tasting participants, who have purchased tasting tickets.

The five categories are: Appetizer, Salad, Side Dish, Entrée/Soup, and Dessert. Each category will be divided into Professional Chef/Restaurant, Amateur, and (for the first time!) a Children's division. All will be vying with other chefs in their division for cash prizes, gifts, and the coveted Lima Bean Trophy!

"Staying true to our lima bean roots, we will begin the tastings with pioneering family Richard Scott's Traditional Pre-1940 Lima Beans," explains Director Grice. "From there, numerous local chefs' imaginations take over, thinking outside the bean pod to create exciting new dishes. The Heritage Ranch will provide the cooks with large dried lima beans, that have been donated by the Greenville Bean Association, which we greatly appreciate.

"The year 2018 marks our *30th Anniversary* of sharing local history, and we want to share our celebration with you! This event is free and family-friendly. The Heritage Ranch's Chuck Wagon will sell food and refreshments. Adding to the fun will be a 'Families Make History' Kid Zone, live music by Earl Flores, a Beer Garden sponsored by Hess Brewing, and a Horseshoe Tournament hosted by Cardiff Riviera Horseshoe Club. Get here by 9 a.m. to register to compete in the tournament, sponsored and hosted by Cardiff Riviera Horseshoe Club," explains Director Grice. "Sign-ups start at 9 a.m., tournament begins at 10 a.m. sharp. Doubles, draw your partner, single elimination. Win BIG prize money and support the Heritage Ranch. There's a \$20 entry fee, and all are welcome to compete.

"Bring the whole family for a fun-filled afternoon. Be sure to shop at our museum's General Store for delicious homemade baked goods, great gifts, and books on local history," she adds.

The historic, restored 1893 Teten House (on the museum grounds) will be available for touring. You may also visit the Bunkhouse, the General Store, and the Native American *kiicha* house.

The Heritage Ranch is located at 450 Quail Gardens Drive, Encinitas 92024. Their museum grounds are usually open 12 p.m. to 4 p.m., Thursday through Sunday.

The National Trust's Preservation Month

May is national *Historic Preservation Month*, created by the National Trust for Historic Preservation (NTHP). "The historic places, public lands, communities, and cultural landmarks that make-up our national identity are the very places we celebrate during May — Preservation Month," says Elizabeth Bruns, NTHP membership director. "They are our connection to the past and allow us the opportunity to experience America's story first-hand.

"One of our guiding principles, as an organization, [is] to work collaboratively with the individuals who make preservation happen. Whether we're helping cities repurpose old buildings in innovative ways, or helping a new generation of Americans learn formative history, places matter because of the people who walked there, dreamed there, triumphed there, even died there. Places matter because of those who draw inspiration from them today."

To celebrate locally, anyone who supports historic preservation may attend the SOHO *People In Preservation Awards* event (see below). In addition, take a "field trip" to visit your area historical societies, most of which have restored historic buildings that they've worked to preserve for future generations. Travel a little and learn something new! Visit historic sites and area museums. Meet the dedicated folks who staff these sites (most of them volunteers, just like you!). Remember to bring the kids, grandkids, nieces, and nephews so they can have fun learning about their own, regional history. Reserve Your Tickets NOW for the SOHO People In Preservation Awards, in the Marston House Formal Garden, Thurs., May 31, 4 p.m.

Marston House Museum's formal garden, on the northern side of the historic home, at 3525 Seventh Ave., West Balboa Park, San Diego, will be the venue of the *36th Annual People In Preservation (PIP) Awards Ceremony* and champagne reception to be held on Thursday, May 31 from 4 p.m. to 6 p.m. **Tickets will go fast, so reserve them now, as no tickets will be sold at the door** (see cost and reservation details below).

Presented by **Save Our Heritage Organisation** (SOHO), this premier, local event celebrates May as *National Preservation Month*. PIP will honor 19 people for their outstanding work on nine projects, including restored homes designed by Irving J. Gill with Hazel Wood Waterman, and David O. Dryden.

The rich mix of accomplishments ranges from a restored Mexican Presbyterian Church to documentary films and photography, and a new Hillcrest coffee roaster's cafe in the 99-year-old former Sisters of Mercy Hospital Annex, previously listed on SOHO's Most Endangered List.

Preservationist of the Year, the top honor in these prestigious preservation awards, is shared by Susan Bugbee, Kelley Stanco, David Swarens, and Bernie Turgeon for their leadership and tireless work over several years on the South Park Historic District. The City of San Diego Historical Resources Board approved it unanimously in October. Making this award even sweeter, the district was also unanimously upheld by the City Council in February after it was challenged by a handful of residents. The awards are held each year at the historic Marston House. One of California's finest examples of the Arts and Crafts movement, the historic Marston House was built in 1905 for George W. Marston and his wife, Anna Gunn Marston, and was designed by the internationally-renowned architects William Sterling Hebbard and Irving J. Gill. George Marston is noted for many things but most prominently as a civic leader whose interest and work in historic preservation, conservation and history is well known.

Come celebrate and pay tribute to those who embody the best in preservation in San Diego County. Tickets include a champagne reception. The *PIP Awards* celebration typically sells out. Reenactment of the Debates For & Against the Creation of Riverside Co. to be featured at the TVHS Meeting, in South Temecula, on Mon., May 21 at 5:30 p.m.

To celebrate the *125th Anniversary* of the formation of Riverside County (which occurred May 2, 1893), the **Temecula Valley Historical Society** (TVHS) will reenact a debate for and against the creation of a new county, at their meeting on Monday, May 21 at 6 p.m. in the Little Temecula History Center, west of Kohl's, in south Temecula.

No reservations are needed for this free event. Current Riverside County Historical Commissioners Steve Lech and Darell Farnbach will participate in the reenactment, with Dick Fox, past-president of the society.


The gentlemen in the historical photo (on the next page, to the right) are the County Commissioners who

The debates reenactment was drafted by Lech to show many of the points argued for and against the creation of the county during debates held throughout the area to engage residents to consider separation from San Bernardino & San Diego Counties.



Local Archaeologist Sandra Pentney to offer a Presentation, *The 150-Year Search for the 1845* Franklin Expedition, at the Next SDCAS Meeting, to be held on Tuesday, May 22, at 7:30 p.m. at the Los Peñasquitos Adobe County Park

Local archaeologist Sandra Pentney will give a presentation on *The 150-Year Search for the 1845 Franklin Expedition* at the next meeting of the **San Diego County Archaeology Society** (SDCAS), to be held on Tuesday, May 22 at 7:30 p.m. at the Los Peñasquitos Adobe County Park, 12020-A Black Mountain Rd. (see directions, below).

On May 19, 1845 two ships left England in search of the fabled Northwest Passage through the Canadian Arctic to the Orient. This presentation will outline the known facts of the expedition, and the 150-year search for the fate of the crew.

Under the leadership of Captain Sir John Franklin, 128 men crewed the *HMS Erebus* and *HMS Terror* for what was planned to be a two-year expedition. The ships had been heavily modified for the expedition by adding iron plating and heavy iron beams in the bow of the ships to withstand the arctic ice. State-of-the-art steam engines were also added, to support the sails to provide more thrust for the ships in the thick ice. Franklin's Expedition was also the first expedition to rely on the revolutionary, new technology of canned foods.

The ships and their crew last had contact with Europeans in July 1845 by a whaling ship, then they disappeared. Within the first 33 years, 25 rescue missions were commissioned to find the ships and their crews. Over the next 117 years, multiple fact-finding missions were commissioned and completed by both the English and Canadians, each adding small amounts of information about the doomed expedition.

In 2014, an expedition led by Parks Canada discovered the wreck of *HMS Erebus*, and then, two years later, located *HMS Terror*. Come hear the details of these searches from the speaker at this free program.

The Los Peñasquitos Adobe is located in the Los Peñasquitos Canyon Preserve, off Black Mountain Road. Take the long driveway, beyond the Canyonside Community Park playing fields, to the very end. HUE NO CRY

Carl Calvert, of the MTM, died Thurs., May 3

We've received sad news from Bryan Butler, director of the Motor Transport Museum (MTM, located at 31949 Highway 94, Campo 91906). He writes that Carl Calvert (see photo, below) died Thursday, May 3, 2018 after a long battle with cancer.

"Carl was one of the few remaining founding-fathers here at the museum," Bryan explains. "He was instrumental in the acquisition of the Feldspar Mill and its use as our museum, as well as the four Camp Lockett former stable buildings.

"He provided for their maintenance and restoration,



often supplying jobs for members of the local community, who worked alongside him, performing the labor.

"He spearheaded museum restoration proj-

CoH Awards were Presented at Our 2018 Conference to People and Organizations that have done Extraordinary Work in Preserving the History of our Region

Each year the Congress of History asks our members, and the public, to nominate people or organizations that have done extraordinary work in preserving the history of our region. Not every award is given every year. Each of the people and organizations honored has a passion and love for what they do. Because of their efforts, our knowledge of the history of our area is enriched. The following were recognized at our March 2018 Conference.

1) An Award of Merit, given for outstanding effort in the preservation of local history by an organization or society, was presented to the Vail Ranch Restoration Association (VaRRA), represented by Rebecca Farnbach, for its extraordinary research on the history of Vail Ranch Headquarters in Temecula, which led to its preservation. In the mid 1990s Temecula residents who love the lore and legends of their region heard that portions of the historic Vail Ranch site were right in the center of where a new retail development was to go. Once a massive ranch of over 87,000 acres, the ranch was sold to developers in 1964. Twenty years ago development began to lurch at a fantastic rate. The area to be developed contained the last remaining portion of the Butterfield Overland Stage Trail and Fort Yuma Road. This is the route that the Mormon Battalion marched in January 1847 on their way to San Diego during the Mexican-American War. Louis Wolfe ran a general store about the same time the Civil War was being fought. Clearly these buildings were historic and needed to be preserved. But, as we know, it's not often that developers sit up and take notice when historians say a place has meaning and value. With the formation of VaRRA as a nonprofit, Rebecca Farnbach and friends delved deep into the history to make the case for preservation. It wasn't easy, it took patience, but they won. The developers built AROUND the historic sites. Instead of razing them, they incorporated the sites into their complex, and restored them. It was a win-win for history and commerce. For this outstanding accomplishment, we presented to VaRRA our Award of Merit.





The **Maritime Museum of San Diego** (MMSD) invites you to our *Father's Day Sailing Celebration* on one of two different ships: either the sailing ship *Californian* (see photo, to the right) on either Saturday, June 16 or Sunday, June 17, or the replica ship *San Salvador*, only on Saturday, June 16.

Get your dad, grandpa, uncle, or big brother out of their easy chair and help them to commemorate their special day with the Maritime Museum! Take them out for a three-hour sail on the beautiful, calm Big Bay, on the *Californian*, a replica cutter, or the *San Salvador*, a replica galleon of Juan Rodriguez Cabrillo's ship of discovery.

The sail begins with a souvenir photo of all in your party, taken on.5 the dock, before you board. We'll take your picture, develop it while you're sailing and have it ready for you when you return, at about 3 p.m.



Even if it's a sunny day, bring a <u>warm jacket</u>. Also bring some sunscreen, a brimmed hat, dark glasses, your sense of adventure, and that special person. We recommend comfortable clothes, flat soft-soled shoes, and your camera! This adventure is better-suited for children ages 6 and older.

The *Californian* is a replica of a gold rush era revenue cutter and the Official Tall Ship of the State of California. The museum's experienced crew will make your Fathers Day celebration unforgettable while sailing aboard a traditionally-rigged tall ship. Passengers will be invited to haul a line, man the helm and we end the day with a rousing cannon salute. Watch the crew as they scamper up and down the rigging to set and furl the sails. Listen as the *Californian*'s crew relate the history of sailing and exploration in San Diego, tales of whaling and sea otter trade, local sea battles, the art of ship's gunnery, life at sea, and more.

The galleon replica San Salvador will be available only on Saturday. The original Spanish galleon San Salvador, under the command of Juan Rodriguez Cabrillo, arrived at the port we now call San Diego on September 28, 1542, before proceeding further north in search of new trade routes that would link Mexico to Asia and Europe. She was the first recorded European vessel to sail along Southern California, and survey its coastline.

Before and after your sailing adventure, enjoy exploring the Maritime Museum (museum admission is included with your ticket). Tickets for the *Californian* are \$70 for each adult; \$48 for each child, 12 to 3; and \$20 for a young child, 2 and younger. Tickets for *San Salvador* (**Saturday only**) are \$90 for each adult; \$58 for each child, 12 to 3; and \$25 for a young child, 2 and younger. (Maritime members are less).

On June 5 Docents & Staff of Guajome County Park to visit Julian

On Tuesday morning, June 5, the **Rancho Guajome Adobe County Park** docents and park staff will be driving from Vista to Julian for their next *Docent Enrichment Outing*. They will meet at the park office at 8:15 a.m. to begin the journey. The group will be visiting the Julian Pioneer Museum, as well as participating in a self-guided tour of the community's many historic buildings. They plan to spend an additional time touring the "downtown" and having lunch in **Jess Martin County Park**; returning to Rancho Guajome at about 1:30 p.m.

Today, Julian is a sleepy little town in the Cuyamaca Mountains. Its regal oaks, rustic bed & breakfast accommodations, and famous apple pie make it a popular destination for townsfolk looking to escape the hustle and bustle of the city. Yet, Julian wasn't always a quiet tourist destination. In the 19th century, it was the center of San Diego's only gold rush. After cattleman and former slave Fred Coleman found a small fleck of gold early in 1870, pioneers headed to the area to make their riches. Tents rapidly popped up around Julian, with miners hoping to strike a claim. By April, the settlement built a sawmill, and Julian began to become a permanent town.

Although most mines shut down by 1900, many residents stayed to farm the rich land, pasturing animals, and growing crops — with apples being the most famous of all.

'ZINES' TO BE SEEN

San Diego History Center presents an Exhibition illuminating a little-known artistic subculture situated at the intersection of writing, printing, painting, and publishing

The first exhibition to explore the confluence of visual art and the written word in mid-century San Diego is now open at the San Diego History Center in the heart of Balboa Park. According to the exhibition curator and San Diego native, Dave Hampton, the exhibit, *Gaps in the Record: Vanguard Print Culture in San Diego*, documents the convergence of literary and visual art practices, and independent publishing activity, in the city's mid-twentieth-century creative community.

The exhibition includes printed matter and visual art produced by a small group of San Diego painters who were also writers: John Baldessari, Fred Cooper, Don Dudley, Malcolm McClain, Richard Allen Morris, and Guy Williams. It also tells the story of their relationships with storied bookstore owner Lafayette "Lafe" Young III and his son Geoffrey Young, a literary press publisher.

The exhibition is a glimpse into a lively literary and artistic subculture that existed over half-a-century ago in San Diego. The works that comprise the show are on loan from the personal archives of the artists involved, and include artists' books, concrete poetry, zines, and handmade chapbooks. Also featured is a first-time survey of Stooge magazine, all issues of the local poetry journal DUCK DUCK (edited by Richard Allen Morris), artists' books by Guy Williams, and the first group portfolio published by noted printer Irwin Hollander.

Exhibition Curator Dave Hampton has worked for many years with visual artists and makers who worked in and around the region during the postwar period. Hampton has developed nine other exhibitions with a focus on mid-century creative culture at several regional institutions. "This exhibition explores a little-known side of some major San Diego artists, a literary side," he explains. "Some of our top mid-century painters wrote poetry and experimental texts. They worked day jobs in bookstores, made their own artists' books and 'zines' (magazines), and published themselves with quick and affordable duplicating machines. It was an extremely creative scene that we hope will resonate with today's young people, who are similarly interested in making art and zines, and community," he concludes.

In addition, "This exhibition provides a singular lens through which to view postwar creative culture in San (Continued on the Next Page)

Diego through an in-depth look at a small, yet remarkable, community of artists whose practices brought together painting, writing, printing and publishing," says Kaytie Johnson, S. D. History Center curator. "We're thrilled to work with guest curator Dave Hampton to bring this important, yet little-known, slice of San Diego's mid-century creative community to the attention of our audiences."

A San Diego native, guest curator Dave Hampton is focused on postwar visual art in California and particularly modernism in the San Diego art and architecture community. He has worked with many artists and object makers who were active in the region during the 50s, 60s and 70s, and contributed to KPBS web, radio, and television on related topics.

Working with institutions such as the Mingei International Museum, the San Diego Public Library Art Gallery, the Oceanside Museum of Art, and the La Jolla Historical Society, Hampton has curated exhibitions that illuminate San Diego's unique and under-documented creative culture.

In 2012 he was presented with the Ruocco Award for innovation in the arts and architecture by Citizens Coordinate For Century 3. In 2016 San Diego CityBeat magazine named Hampton "Curator of the Year."

The San Diego History Center is a Smithsonian Affiliate. SDHC operates its flagship museum on the Prado, in the heart of Balboa Park, as well as the Junípero Serra Museum in historic Presidio Park.

- 2) The importance of preserving information (and, the flip side retrieving information) is of paramount importance to historians and to anyone researching history. Excellence in these areas was recognized by the Congress of History via two awards: the Mary Ward Memorial Award for Historic Archives and Records Management for archivist Candice Hooper, and the Evelyn Kooperman Library Award, for a substantial public or private library collection or library department focusing on the preservation of the history of the region, for the Coronado Public Library. Archivist Candice Hooper leads a team of employees, interns, and volunteers who preserve the history of Coronado and North Island. For example, the deed to Babcock and Story of the land of the Hotel del Coronado can be seen at the library. Candice has worked to digitize the large collection of area maps to be put online. Also online is a project documenting the houses of Coronado showing photos of the home over time as well as a brief history of the structure. The library works as both a library and museum to preserve the history of Coronado and the military. As part of the City of Coronado (rather than the County Library system), this library was originally built and endowed by John D. Spreckels to serve the people of Coronado. The original building, designed by Harrison Albright in his signature San Diego/ Spreckels style, was built to survive an earthquake. It has survived the decades and expansion, leaving a beautiful reading room that also serves as a community museum, a large children's area, a hallway used for changing exhibits, computers for research and student use, as well as the stacks. The library also supports lectures, concerts, and other events. It's a place of both beauty and function. With these two awards we recognized the important work of archivist Candice Hooper and the Coronado Public Library. Evelyn Kooperman, a retired librarian, and our former CoH Secretary (for whom the award is named), was in attendance to join in presenting the award.
- 3) The Media Award is presented to a person or medium that contributes significantly to the preservation and development of the history of the region. When the Congress of History began in 1964, "media" meant traditional newspapers, magazines, or television. In no historian's wildest dreams, back then, would we have thought that there would be electronic media. Electronic media can be a joy, in that so much amazing knowledge is now available to anyone who has a computer. This award recognizes the important work being done by Gregory May and Vintage San Diego, the online photographic resource archive dedicated to preserving the visual history of our region's built environment. Gregory saw so much of San Diego being destroyed that he wanted to collect photos and videos of landmarks, locations, buildings, and streets and make the images available to anyone, at no cost. He created a community-centric digital archive that shares history with its orderly, extraordinarily-organized albums of photos. Now anyone in the world can research images of San Diego and see photos that in the past never made it into formal archives: the snapshots of building details, taken by regular folks, that give historians amazing glimpses into the past. In only about five short years Gregory's Vintage San Diego Facebook platform has thousands of members. For his innovation and dedication to the history of San Diego via Vintage San Diego, we presented Gregory May with our Media Award.
- 4) An Award of Merit is given to a society or organization for outstanding effort in the preservation of local history. This year it went to our friends at the Portuguese Historical Center for keeping the history of the Portuguese-American community of San Diego alive. For over 40 years the history and traditions of the Portuguese families of San Diego have been shared not only with the younger generations but with all of San Diego. This is not a minor thing. In over 100 years a community can be dispersed and lose touch with its people. The reasons that originally kept a people together can change over time. It takes work and dedication to make a vibrant group that educates and honors the past while making contemporary memories. Whether it's a tradition of dance or a tradition of worship, like the beautiful Festa honoring Queen Saint Isabel, the many contributions of the Portuguese-Americans to San Diego history are recorded and remembered at the Portuguese Historical Center and Chapel. As Point Loma changes, and new development threatens to forever change the look and feel of this historic community, we support the PHC in its quest to rebrand the area along Avenida de Portugal (from the Museum, Chapel, and Portuguese Hall up to Saint Agnes Church, three blocks away) as "Little Portugal." For their decades of work preserving the history of this community, we presented the Portuguese Historical Center of San Diego an Award of Merit.
- 5) Our highest honor, the **Ben Dixon Award**, is named for one of the founding historians of the Congress of History. We don't present this award lightly, nor do we award it every year. This year we honored historian and cultural landscape specialist **Vonn Marie May**. For three decades Vonn has been doing innovative research to interpret historical sites. Vonn is a force of nature who is tenacious and passionate about the places that have meaning. She doesn't give up. She finds the deep, interesting details that make us say "why didn't I see that?" She's a planner and a planner's resource; you hire Vonn when you want to get a deep understanding of a site. We're not the first to know of Vonn's skills. She's been honored by other prestigious institutions such as the American Institute of Architects, the American Planning Association, and the California Preservation Foundation. She's also received the California State Governor's Award for her work in historic preservation and cultural landscapes. For all that she has done to uncover and share the history of our region, we honored Vonn Marie May with the Congress of History's Ben Dixon Award.


