knowledge of local history. When I moved to San Diego in 1975, I was in new territory far from my Santa Barbara County home base. I am from that part of California where the ocean is south of the roadways.

Hawaii's directions of "makai" (toward the ocean) or "mauka" (toward the mountain) make more sense when the ocean and the sunset don't line-up like they do in all those gorgeous photos.

As a newcomer to San Diego, I read signs at the intersection of Interstates 8 and 5 in San Diego that gave me choices that I didn't understand: "El Cajon and Beaches." I didn't want to go to the beach and I didn't know where El Cajon was! There wasn't GPS in those days, and there wasn't even the handy Thomas Brothers map books.

Trying to both drive *and* read a foldout map with small print (and it wasn't as small to me then as it is now) contributed to a lot of wrong turns or not turning when I should have. I did, however, become familiar with areas that were far from our rented house in North Park.

Through attending Congress of History meetings and conferences I have purposely explored east, west, north, and south. Even with all the GPS I still sometimes make wrong turns. However, now when I see signs for Coronado, Lakeside, National City, Vista, Fallbrook, Lemon Grove, Oceanside, Spring Valley, Barona, Çamp Pendleton, Sycuan, Villa Montezuma, Warner Springs, Tecate, Temecula, and many others, I'm confident that I know where to recommend a great museum or historic site in each community.

If I haven't been to a place for a few years, I like to return to see what has changed. # TVHS presents 'Rock Art in the Grand Canyon Region — The Adventure' on Mon., May 20

On Monday, May 20 at 6 p.m. the **Temecula Valley Historical Society** (TVHS) will present Steve Freers (see photo below) who will give his lecture "*Rock Art in the Grand Canyon Region — The Adventure*" at the Little Temecula History Center, the red barn west of Kohl's at the corner of Wolf Store Road and Redhawk Parkway. The presentation is open to the public at no charge.

Freers, an IB and Honors chemistry teacher at the Temescal Canyon High School in Lake Elsinore, has spent over 30 years researching Native American rock art in Riverside and San Diego counties, as well as concentrated studies in the Grand Canyon region. In 1994,

he co-authored the book *Fading Images* about rock art in western Riverside County.

In May of 2013 a 288-page book entitled *Rock Art of the Grand Canyon Region* by Don Christensen, Jerry Dickey, and Steve Freers was published, as the result of an extensive rock art recording project in Grand Canyon National Park.

During his presentation to the historical society, Freers will give an overview of approximately 5,000 years of Native American rock art painted and engraved on canyon walls and boulders within the greater Grand Canyon region, an area stretching south from the Arizona-Utah border to the Mogollon Rim. The audience will be taken on

a behind-the-scenes journey to vicariously experience the awe of hiking within magnificent canyon systems, negotiating rugged and steep trails, and discovery of ancient human presence. According to Frees, he hopes his presentation will impart not just the sense of adventurous research, but a closer understanding of the integration of such a powerful environment and its influence on the aboriginal artists who painted or carved the Grand Canyon's ancient art.

Freers' specialty is in taking a physical anthropological approach to rock art research. Using anthropometric data collected by the famous anthropologist Franz Boas in the late 1800s and early 1900s, Freers modified a regression equation that assists in predicting the physical stature and gender of the makers of prehistoric handprints. His most recent research explores rock art along the Takic and Yuman ethnographic division in southern California, as well as examining the chronological

In February 2018 the Board voted to discontinue the hard-copy version of our newsletter. However, we also voted **not** to immediately abandon our dear members who do not have access to computers. Those members will be provided with paper copies through June 2020. (To receive electronic copies of *Adelante*, please send us your e-mail addresses, if you have not already done so.)

Members who have already paid an additional fee for hard copies will be provided those hard copies for the number of years for which they have already paid, up through the membership year ending in June 2020 (any mailing fee payments already made <u>beyond that date</u> will be returned as a refund, if requested).

The newsletter topic has been discussed at length for many years. In fact, the discussion has involved different CoH Boards. Several years ago the Board voted to charge a small mailing fee, in addition to membership, for paper copies. The amount of the fee has been increased from time to time; currently it's \$7 extra, per yearly renewal.

sequence of petroglyph creation at a newly recorded Colorado Desert site. As an avid hiker and photographer, Steve has captured the dynamic context of archaeological sites in the Southwest's most remote areas.

The Arizona Governor's Archaeology Advisory Commission awarded Freers and his co-authors the 2014 Arizona Governor's Award for Special Achievement in Public Archaeology for their book and for their contribution of over 10,000 volunteer hours documenting archaeological sites for public agencies. In 2016, Freers was awarded the Crabtree Award by the Society for American Archaeology (SAA) for his outstanding contributions to the field of archaeology, cultural heritage preservation, and public education. Steve currently serves as the program and conservation chair for the San Diego Rock Art Association (SDRAA) and continues to conduct field work in northern San Diego County.

The public is welcome to arrive at 5:30 p.m. for refreshments and a social time, followed at 5:45 p.m. by an introduction of the society's two recipients of college scholarships for entering history-related careers. There is no cost to attend. After the presentation, Freers' books will be available for purchase and signing, for \$20 each.



The museum grounds are usually open from 12 p.m. to 4 p.m., Thursday through Sunday. Museum entry is free to SDHM members, and with donations from guests.

Congress of History members first read about the pillar-project in this column, last year.

As I wrote in the September 2018 edition of *Adelante*, . . . In April of 2018 Lemon Grove Girl Scout Troop 6786, led by Courtney Cuellar, restored two, century-old "Crestland Park Pillars" that mark the east entrance into Cuyamaca Ave., from Buena Vista Ave. Helen Ofield, president of the Lemon Grove Historical Society, was the historical consultant for the piller-project. According to Ofield, Cuyamaca Ave. neighborhood residents of 40 to 60 years have related to the society that the pillars "...have been struck by vehicles at least eight times, which would account for loose globes, loss of stucco, non-matching stucco repair, paint work, etc.

"In addition to restoring the pillars, the troop built little box-gardens of succulents around the base of each (*Continued on Page 11*)

In November 2017 the discussion involved not only the financial cost of mailing the paper copies of the Ad*elante*, but we also considered the labor and time involved in preparing and mailing the hard copies.

The Congress of History has been blessed by the willingness of Helen and Andrew Halmay to volunteer hours and hours of their time to have copies printed, to tape the edges of the newsletters, to purchase and affix postage, to print and affix mailing address labels, and to deliver the completed hard-copy Adelantes to the US Post Office, all while on a deadline. Those free hours add up to days, weeks, and months — for over 20 years!

Looking toward the future, when there will be a new newsletter editor, the Board realized that none of the rest of us would be willing to commit that much labor and time into providing paper copies of the *Adelante*.

Today, most other organizations provide only electronic newsletters. When this first happened to me, it took me awhile to become accustomed to reading the articles without actually touching paper.

What I have found, over time, is that I usually sit down and read the entire newsletter in one or two sittings, which can easily be accomplished online. With the digital version I can reference information at any time. If I have an interest in a specific topic/article (or more) in that edition, I can also print copies of just the pages that I need. (Please recall that you can always print color pages B&W.)

While some of you are not happy with this decision, I think you will enjoy the full-color, that is so easy to provide online and so expensive to provide for paper copies.

We look forward to future journeys into the past with the Congress of History newsletter, the *Adelante*.

# Rancho Bernardo Historical Society honors Military with *Memorial Day Pancake Breakfast*, Mon., May 27

**Rancho Bernardo Historical Society** (RBHS) will hold its *Annual Pancake Breakfast Honoring Our Military* on Memorial Day, Monday, May 27 between 8 a.m. and 12 Noon, at Webb Lake Park, Avena Pl. and Bernardo Center Dr.,

Rancho Bernardo 92128. A Veterans' Memorial Service will follow the breakfast, at 11 a.m. at the park. Parking available in a lot adjoining the park; look for the signs.

Cost for the pancake breakfast is \$8 per person.

Veterans, current active military, and children under 3

are free. All military personnel who attend in uniform, or bring in an old photo in uniform, will eat for free. All the photos will be scanned for placement on the Rancho Bernardo Historical Soc.Museum's *Military Wall of Honor*. In addition to the breakfast, there will be music, face painting, a bounce house, raffles, and prizes, all in a picnic setting. Local merchants have donated dozens of raffle prizes including gift baskets, restaurant certificates, floral arrangements, and additional goodies.

The Rancho Bernardo Historical Society was founded in 1982, twenty years after modern Rancho Bernardo was begun. Meetings were held at various places and, despite multiple efforts, the society never had a permanent home to display and store its collection until 2005.

Thanks to the interest and generosity of the late Ross Rizzo of the Bernardo Winery, the society was given a small storage shed and shipping container to "remodel" on the grounds of the Bernardo Winery winery. A few years later, the society moved to a climate-controlled building at the winery and then RBHS found its truly permanent home when it remodeled and occupied a historic bunkhouse at the entrance to the winery, located at 13330 Paseo del Verano Norte, San Diego 92128. Today, the museum has many exhibits displaying local RB history, from the Kumeyaay to the town of Bernardo, to the modern industrial park. It's open six days a week and admission is free. 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
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# The National Trust's Preservation Month

# **Reserve Your Tickets NOW** for the SOHO *People In Preservation Awards*, in the Marston House Formal Garden, Thurs., May 30, 4 p.m.

Marston House Museum's formal garden (see photo above), on the northern side of the historic home, located at 3525 Seventh Ave., West Balboa Park, San Diego, will be the venue of the 36th Annual People In Preservation (PIP) Awards Ceremony and champagne reception to be held on Thursday, May 30 from 4 p.m. to 6 p.m. Tickets will go fast, so reserve them now, as NO tickets will be sold at the door (see cost and reservation details below).

Presented by **Save Our Heritage Organisation** (SOHO), this premier, local event celebrates May as *National Preservation Month*. PIP will honor those who have done outstanding work on local preservation projects. The PIP awards are held each year at the historic Marston House, one of California's finest examples of the Arts and Crafts movement. The home was built in 1905 for George W. Marston and his wife, Anna Gunn Marston, and was designed by the internationally-renowned architects William Sterling Hebbard and Irving J. Gill. George Marston is noted for many things but most prominently as a civic leader whose interest and work in historic preservation, conservation and history is well known.

Come celebrate and pay tribute to those who embody the best in preservation in San Diego County. Tickets include a champagne reception. The *PIP Awards* celebration typically sells out. NOTE: NO tickets will be sold at the door. PIP tickets are \$45 ea. for SOHO Members (\$48.24 w/service fee), and \$55 ea. for Non-Members (\$58.74 w/service fee). Manages the Corporation's funds; receives all monies from all sources; has check signature authorization for disbursements approved by the Board of Directors; makes payment of all bills when due; and prepares required financial statements. Deposits all monies received into bank accounts to the credit of the Congress. Maintains and keeps records of all business transactions of the Congress. These books and accounts shall be open for inspection by any member in good standing. Is responsible for the preparation and filings of any reports required by the State of California or any other governmental organization regarding non-profit organizations.
- Special Events Treasurer: Helen Halmay. Is responsible for receiving, recording, and transmitting to the Treasurer monies received for fees from the Annual Conference, Workshops, and other special activities. Disburses funds from the Congress' bank account in pursuance of his or her duties.

pillar, as a further protective measure. (See a photo of the north pillar, below right, with the small garden at the base. See also, on page 17, an enlargement of the bottom plaque. Both these photos taken by Loren Hobbs.)

"We thank Steve Mitchell, manager of the Home Depot in Lemon Grove, who donated lumber, paint, and bags of potting soil for the little gardens at the base of the two pillars," Ofield concludes.

This successful Girl Scout Silver Award pillar-project makes me very happy, as I have a personal connection

with restoring these "guardian" pillars. They're very familiar to me since I lived, for about 10 years (with my first husband and son), one short block away from the pillars, at the opposite end of Cuyamaca Ave., at the corner with New Jersey.

In 1980 I became concerned about the condition of the pillars; they were looking ragged. One of the "globes" was just about to fall off, and the top surface of the

other "globe" was disintegrating from weathering and the growth of moss.

So, I asked my late father-in-law, Thomas Henry "Hank" Hobbs (who lived in Spring Valley, at the time) to help me repair the pillars, because he had years of construction experience, so he knew the correct methods and materials to use to properly stabilize them (which the two of us set-about success-

On April 11, 1769 the first seaborne contingent of Spanish settlement arrived is a quiet harbor in San Diego aboard the ship San Antonio. 

Take them out for a three-hour sail on the beautiful, calm Big Bay, on the Californian, a replica cutter, or the San Salvador, a replica galleon of Juan Rodriguez Cabrillo's ship of discovery.

For lunch, each adult and child receives a boxed sandwich lunch, that includes a cookie, and two cold beers per adult. Soft drinks will be available for the kids. Lunch will be served on board the ships, while they are underway. Boarding/check-in ends at 11:30 a.m. The three-hour

sailing trip will begin shortly after 11:30 a.m. and returns to port at about 3 p.m.

The Californian is a replica of a gold rush era revenue cutter and the Official Tall Ship of the State of California. The museum's experienced crew will make your Fathers Day celebration unforgettable while sailing aboard a traditionally-rigged tall ship. Passengers will be invited to haul a line, and man the helm, if they wish. We end the day with a rousing cannon salute. Watch the crew as they scamper up and down the rigging to set and furl the sails. Listen as the Californian's crew relate the



history of sailing and exploration in San Diego, tales of whaling and sea otter trade, local sea battles, the art of ship's gunnery, life at sea, and more. If you choose to sail on the replica galleon, San Salvador, you will also be sailing with local history. The original Spanish galleon, San Salvador, under the command of Juan Rodriguez Cabrillo, arrived at the port we now call San Diego on September 28, 1542, before proceeding further north in search of new trade routes that would link Mexico to Asia and Europe. She was the first recorded European vessel to sail along Southern California, and survey its coastline.

Before and after your sailing adventure, enjoy exploring the Maritime Museum (museum admission is included with your ticket). Tickets for either the Californian or the San Salvador are \$99 for each adult; \$59 for each child, 12 to 3; and \$25 for a young child, 2 and younger.
