
Renew your CoH Membership for 2019-2020

"manse" parsonage. The museum is located at 12418 Parkside Ave., adjacent to the church.

History of the Lakeside Historical Society

Lakeside became a town site in 1886 as a tourist destination with the building of the Lakeside Inn. The large Inn wasknown as the "Hotel Del of East County," because of its similarity to the Hotel Del Coronado. The Inn advertised boating and fishing on Lindo Lake, hunting, and just plain old relaxing. The Inn continued to operate until 1916, despite a fire severe enough to require a partial reconstruction. When the old building was torn down in 1920 it was only to make way for a new hotel, which was never built.

The Lakeside Historical Society was founded in 1972 and is dedicated to the preservation and education of Lakeside's diverse history. The home of the society is the Olde Community Church, the town's first church, located in the heart of the historical district of Lakeside. This district covers most of Maine Ave. and includes buildings of all eras, from the 1890s to the 1920s, up until today.

Constructed in 1896 and never moved from its current location, the historic church was originally a Presbyterian Church. In 1962 the Presbyterians moved to a new santuary building in Lakeside. The LHS met at the old church and eventually purchased the Maine Ave. building and began restoring it. The society's "manse" museum was acquired later, restored, then opened in 2004.

FREE Temecula Program about 'The Murder of Mrs. Platt,' offered by TVHS on Mon., July 22 at 6 p.m.

Temecula Valley Historical Society (TVHS) invites the public to attend a free presentation about "*The Murder of Mrs. Platt*," to be offered on Monday, July 22 at 6 p.m. in the Little Temecula History Center, located in



the red barn at the corner of Redhawk Parkway and Wolf Store Road (next door to the Kohl's store).

The presenter will be Oscar Muñoz, M.A. (see his photo, left). Muñoz is a public historian for the Pechanga Band of Luiseño Indians and a Ph.D. student at the University of California, Riverside. The program will cover the 1894 murder

of Mary J. Platt, the teacher at the Pechanga school (see the black and white photo, top of the next page).

Muñoz, who researches Native American history of Southern California, will discuss the documentary evidence as well as traditional oral narratives and will analyze possible motives that led to the murder of Platt and the destruction of the Pechanga schoolhouse on September 20, 1894.

He will tell how news of the event spread throughout (Continued on Next Page)

Vail Ranch Restoration Association and Temecula Valley Historical Society to merge in September



An Upcoming Merger will Soon Blend Two Sister Groups

Many of you are familiar with the complementary relationship between the **Vail Ranch Restoration Associa**tion (VaRRA) and the Temecula Valley Historical Society (TVHS). Originally, this area had no historical society, so when there was a real threat of demolition of all the buildings at Vail Ranch Headquarters (except the Wolf Store) in the mid-1990s, the VaRRA was formed. That started the long process to save and protect the Vail Headquarters and to develop it into its current, living history site [that's located east of the red barn, that's at the corner of Redhawk Parkway and Wolf Store Road, next door to the modern Kohl's store, in Little Temecula; see photo below]. In 2000, many of those same people (with the addition of others) decided there was a need for another historical group with a broader vision of historical entities to protect. As a result, they formed the Temecula Valley Historical Society.

A couple of months ago, with the Vail Headquarters site nearing the completion of its restoration, the VaRRA board of directors asked TVHS to consider merging into one organization, the Temecula Valley Historical Society. After a legal consultation by representatives from both organizations, VaRRA has asked TVHS to file a "Doing Business As" (DBA), thereafter doing business as the Vail Ranch Restoration Associate, effective September 1, 2019. This is beneficial in several ways, especially in financial savings and the reduction of duplication of efforts. Starting immediately only one newsletter will be produced, containing news of all aspects of the consolidated organization.

TVHS will gain responsibilities in taking care of the Little Temecula History Center (in the red barn, previously the responsibility of VaRRA) and there will be a VaRRA committee to continue watching-over the historic ranch property. Both boards of directors welcome these as necessary changes and believe it is a positive move.


Stagecoach Days Schedule:

- August 3 (Noon to 4 p.m.) "Trades that Shaped the West" As towns developed in the West, so did the need for specialized trades and artisans. Old Town San Diego State Historic Park will present 19th Century trades that helped shape the community of San Diego.
- August 10 (Noon to 4 p.m.) "Soldiers and Citizens" The military has been part of San Diego since the inception. Following the Mexican-American war, the soldiers of many cultures had an impact on life in San Diego. See San Pasqual Battlefield soldiers in historic uniforms, weapons, demonstrations, and listen to the soldier's stories.
- August 17 (11a.m. to 5 p.m.) "Twainfest" This wildly popular festival celebrates literacy and the literary works of Mark Twain and other 19th Century authors. TwainFest is a celebration of Mark Twain (see photo, left), and other writers of the 1900s. Geomicrobiology Experiments on Desert Varnish, Rubification, and Encrusting Caliche on Rocks & Artifacts in the Anza Borrego Desert to be Topic of SDCAS Program on Sat. Evening, July 27 at Los Peñasquitos

Geomicrobiology Experiments on Desert Varnish, Rubification, and Encrusting Caliche in the Anza Borrego Desert will be the topic of a program presented by Eleanora "Norrie" Robbins (US Geological Survey-retired, SDSU-retired) at the next summer meeting of the **San Diego County Archaeological Society** (SDCAS), to be held on Saturday, July 27 at 8 p.m. outside, in the patio of the Los Peñasquitos Adobe. The meeting/program if free and open to the public.

NOTE: During just the summer months, SDCAS' Summer Saturday Meetings will replace the usual fourth Tuesday programs. There will be **no** fourth Tuesday meetings/programs in July, or August.



The public is invited to arrive early and bring a picnic dinner, chairs, and drinks. It can get cool in the canyon at night (even during the summer), so long-sleeves, jackets, and/or blankets are recommended. Bug repellent is also recommended. Please bring your own chairs. SDCAS will provide dessert.

The evening's topic concerns experiments on a trio of substances found on rocks and artifacts in the Anza-Borrego Desert. Black/brown desert varnish composed primarily of manganese oxides is the best known. But the undersides of artifacts often have red iron oxide which is called *rubification*. Furthermore, some artifacts have a rim of white calcium carbonate that is otherwise called *caliche*.

Having a geomicrobiology background, Robbins tends to focus on "sterile" chemical reactions that are supposedly devoid of life. Instead, these three sub-

stances (desert varnish, rubification, and caliche) are catalyzed by bacteria.

"Elusive timing for these reactions in the desert makes it a challenge to run microbial experiments," Robbins explains. "For example, research is suggesting that desert varnish may be related to ice-age climatic regimes when the desert was subjected to much more rainfall and colder weather. The closest we can come to this ancient regime is to run experiments over very long time scales that include many rainy seasons and winters.

"With that caveat, (when researching desert varnish) I used a microbial ecology technique of putting out microscope slides on boulders and rocks in the desert. I put (the slides) out in 2002 and studied the microbial populations that colonized them since then. Mn-oxidizing *Leptothrix discophora* is present on several sets I pulled in 2016. So Mn-oxidizing bacteria do participate in Mn fixation in desert varnish.

"Rubification experiments started in 2019 have not yet yielded any results. But my hypothesis is that water standing under rocks and artifacts during the rainy season supports iron oxidizing bacteria that are reacting to reduced iron minerals in the sediment.

"Calcification (*caliche*) experiments started in 2019 have not yet yielded any results, either. But my hypothesis is that water standing around the rims of rocks and artifacts is ideal habitat for photosynthetic cyanobacteria that precipitate CaCO3. An interesting observation is that white quartz and feldspar pebbles and artifacts have green rims from colonizing cyanobacteria. It will be interesting to compare species entombed by *caliche* with those forming dark green rims."

The public is invited to arrive early and bring a picnic dinner, chairs, and drinks. It can get cool in the canyon at night – especially when the evenings are damp – so long-sleeves, jackets, and/or blankets are recommended. Bug repellent is also suggested. The program begins at 8 p.m., but the park is open before that.

The Los Peñasquitos Adobe is located in the Los Peñasquitos Canyon Preserve, off Black Mountain Rd.; drive beyond the Canyonside Community Park playing fields, to the end of the road. Ocean Beach Historical Society (OBHS) continues the year-long celebration of its 25th Anniversary by presenting a **FREE Concert** on Saturday, August 17, at the beautiful Greek Theatre on the campus of Point Loma Nazarene University, which will feature the very popular San Diego City Guard Band.

Concert-goers are encouraged to arrive early to enjoy a picnic in this picturesque setting. Bring your own picnic or purchase popcorn, lemonade, or something else delicious from one of the food vendors who will be on hand.

OBHS has been working with the Heritage Band Society and its *City Guard Band* to present a concert of popular tunes and marches covering the last 100 years. The free concert will begin promptly at 6 p.m.

The relationship between Ocean Beach and the *City Guard Band* goes back to 1887, when Carlson and Higgins first started selling lots in newly-named and subdivided Ocean Beach. The developers realized that the best way to draw a crowd out to the remote stretch of sand dunes was to hire San Diego's most popular band, the City Guard Band, to play at several of their

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weekend events. In 1897, when Katherine Tingley laid the cornerstone for what became the Theosophical Estate, Lomaland, the City Guard Band played for the event. Only four years later, Madame Tingley opened the first Greek Theatre in North America (San Diego's oldest remaining and most-iconic venue) which will be the site of the August 17 concert.

The present day City Guard Band stands as a memorial to one of the first San Diego bands. In the 1800s, the City of San Diego supported a volunteer community militia as protection against the risks associated with life in the early days of the city. The group was referred to as the City Guard (later included in the California National Guard).



The City Guard Band was an auxiliary unit of the militia, which eventually became part of the California National Guard. The Band served the needs of the city and as its emissary, around the state and across the nation. The Band gradually disintegrated in the wake of World War I, with many of the musicians moving to other local groups.

In 1980, one hundred years after the initial formation of the City Guard Band, a group of local musicians who were interested in preserving "turn-of-the-century" band music formed the Heritage Band Society, a California a 501(c)(3) non-profit corporation. The Society re-established the City Guard Band to keep alive the musical heritage by performing period music (1880 to 1950) in its library of nearly 3,000 compositions.

Ocean Beach Historical Society maintains an expanding archive of books, maps, oral histories, photographs, artifacts and publications which is open weekly for public research and investigation. They are proud to continue their tradition of active involvement with other community, civic, business, municipal, educational, charitable, and faith-based groups in Ocean Beach. Now, in 2019, OBHS is in the 25th year of offering their well-received series of monthly lectures and special community events, always well-publicized and always free to the public.

Awards presented at Our 2019 History Conference

Each year the Congress of History asks our members to nominate people or organizations that have done extraordinary work preserving the history of our region. (Not every award is given every year.)

Each of the people and organizations honored has a passion and love for what they do. Because of their efforts, our knowledge of the history of our area is enriched. The following were recognized at our March 2019 Conference.

1) An **Award of Merit**, given for outstanding effort in the preservation of local history by an organization or society, was presented to the **Sycuan Band of the Kumeyaay Nation** for the Sycuan Cultural Center, represented by Carl Shipek, for fulfilling the vision of creating a home to house the special collection of the late Dr Florence Shipek and for Kumeyaay Community College to better educate tribal members in Kumeyaay language, culture, and philosophy. In December 2016 the Sycuan Band unveiled a new facility that centralizes and secures

an enormous amount of ancient Kumeyaay artifacts, museum-quality collections, and a vast array of scholarly research, including the collection of Dr. Shipek. The Cultural Center is a gathering place to host presentations on culture and history and to promote thoughtful dialogue. A wall-length timeline and pictogram serve as a striking summation of more than 12,000 years of Kumeyaay history over the ages and into the modern era. And the Kumeyaay Community College, which opened in 2005, was established to fulfill the wishes of Dr. Shipek to receive the archives, so that the knowledge gathered in the modern era would never be lost. For this outstanding accomplishment, we presented the Sycuan Band of the Kumeyaay Nation an Award of Merit.

- 2) The **Special Project Award** was presented to a person or group that has achieved something special for the history of the region. That award went to the **Community Coalition of University Heights** (CCUH) for facilitating the preservation and adaptive reuse of two historic structures located on the Education Center site in University Heights. You've probably seen the Teachers Training Building Annex 1 from the road, where over the past 20 years this stately building has suffered serious neglect despite being on the National Register of Historic Places. (The University Heights Historical Society and historian Alexander D. Bevil were responsible for the historic designation in 1999.) The Community Coalition brought together community members, elected officials, and decision makers within the Board of Education. They convinced the Board that the November 2018 \$3.5 million dollar bond measure to redevelop its Normal Street campus should include preservation and adaptive reuse of not only the Teachers Training Building but also the Alice Birney Kindergarten Annex 2. They convinced California Senator prop Tem Toni Atkins and San Diego Unified School Board Trustee Richard Barrera to support their recommendation. Thanks to the Community Coalition of University Heights this made it onto the ballot. Then, in November 2018, thanks to the voters, Measure YY was approved by 65% of the voters. After more than 20 years of effort, the Community Coalition made it happen and we can't wait for the restoration. For amazing success with this special project and dedication to the history of San Diego, we presented the University Heights Community Coalition with the Special Project Award.
- 3) This year we presented a second **Award of Merit**, given for outstanding effort in the preservation of local history by an organization or society, this time honoring the **Barona Cultural Center and Museum** for their outstanding programming and community outreach that, in the words of the federal Museum and Library Service, "touches the lives of individuals and helps communities thrive." If you've been to see the Barona Museum in Lakeside you know of the band's dedication to the traditions and language of the Kumeyaay, and to many fun and interesting hands-on learning opportunities for people all over the region to be taught by experts. We at the Congress of History have always thought that this museum was a special place, and now the staff's dedication to the museum's mission has been recognized at a federal level. After we recognized their achievements back in March, the Barona Cultural Center and Museum received the prestigious National Medal for Museum and Library Services and traveled to Washington, D.C. in June to accept the award. It's the nation's highest federal honor given to museums and libraries for public service to the community, and recognizes that museums serve as vital community resources. For their

strong community involvement with innovative, exciting programming, we honored the Barona Cultural Center and Museum with an Award of Merit.

- 4) The Congress of History presented the Mary Ward Memorial Award for Historic Archives and Records Management (given to an organization for outstanding archival work) to the Lambda Archives of San Diego, for the creation of an archive that allows for a depth of research and understanding of a community whose history was (until not so long ago) not documented nor recorded. The Lambda Archives, founded in 1987, serves as a place for dialogue and discovery, a place to "preserve and teach our history." The Out at the Archives series brings speakers to share on a variety of topics. The recording of LGBTQ+ history allows youth to learn that they are not alone and they can learn about others whose history can inspire them. It's a place to build upon the trailblazers of the past. At the Museum of San Diego History (at the S. D. History Center, Balboa Park) through January 20, 2020, you can see the groundbreaking exhibit "LGBTQ+ San Diego: Stories of Struggles and Triumphs," the result of the collaboration between the Lambda Archives and the San Diego History Center. For the creation of an archives that acknowledges and celebrates gay history and the people who fought against intolerance and for equality, we honored the Lambda Archives of San Diego with the Mary Ward Award for Historic Archives and Records Management.
- 5) The **Award of Honor** is given to an individual for outstanding effort in the preservation of local history. The Congress of History recognized the accomplishments of the amazing **Leon Williams**, who was instrumental as an elected official in preserving San Diego's historic downtown and turning it into the "Gaslamp Quarter," who as a City of San Diego council member successfully represented the community's fight to have the Villa Montezuma Museum become a City-owned historic resource, and for bringing his insight and wisdom to various boards by serving organizations like the San Diego Historical Society for many years. Leon is known as one of the most successful, resourceful, and effective elected officials we've ever had in San Diego, having served the City as the first African-American council member, and then the County as a County Supervisor. Leon also ran the Metropolitan Transit Development Board for many years as chair of the board. The San Diego State University trolley station is dedicated to him, and the Mid-Coast trolley line extension that is currently under construction (going from Old Town Station to the UTC area) is a direct result of his many years of hard work. Leon has brought about consensus on difficult topics, and we can look to how he always respected people and reached across the aisle to win major gains for the preservation of history for the region. A kind, smart, charming man, Leon has been a leader for most of his 97 years. For a lifetime of community dedication and caring about the history of our region, we celebrated Leon Williams with an Award of Honor.
- 6) Our highest honor, the **Ben Dixon Award,** is named after one of the founding historians of the Congress of History. We don't give out this award lightly, nor do we give it out every year. This year we honor a historic "power couple," **Jack Larimer and Sharon Larimer** of the **Vista Historical Society.** Sharon was born in Caracas, Venezuela (Continued on the Next Page)

to American parents working in the oil industry. They returned to the US when Sharon was nine years old and settled in Vista. As an adult, Sharon worked for the City of Vista for 36 years.

Jack Larimer was born and raised in Vista. He earned his degrees in economics from SDSU and from UCSD. Jack worked in the Vista Planning Department for 30 years. Since 2002 he's been the Director of the Vista Historical Society Museum.

Married for many years, this history-loving power-couple have worked tirelessly to explore, research, record, and share the history of their area. Most places have easily-defined boundaries. Not for Vista. The large rural area was called many names by many people over time; and sometimes history that happened there wasn't easy to lock-in without understanding land issues. This is where Jack's expertise from the Planning Dept. was a big help.

The Larimers are skilled at building partnerships and fostering community, so others may experience and enjoy the history of Vista and the beauty of Rancho Minerva. For all that they have done to uncover, promote, and share the history of our region, we honored Sharon and Jack Larimer with the Congress of History's Ben Dixon award.



Her websites offer locations or buildings to visit, or one may purchase more specific information from her with a membership. For more details, check out both sites!



SOHO Showcased 11 San Diego Projects at the Recent 2019 *People In Preservation* Awards

Save Our Heritage Organisation (SOHO), San Diego's countywide preservation group celebrating its 50th anniversary year, recently presented 11 *People In Preservation* awards for outstanding projects as varied as the restoration of a Spanish Colonial Revival home on a Mission Hills canyon, the meticulous rehabilitation of a 1926 bungalow court, and a definitive survey of the architectural and cultural landscape history of UC San Diego's campus.



In this its 37th year, SOHO's preservation awards ceremony saluted 23 individuals, groups, or entities on Thursday, May 30, during *National Preservation Month*. SOHO's preservation heroes this year ranged in age from strong, industrious 13-year-olds to the energetic octogenarian John Henderson. The winners excelled at six residential and commercial restoration projects and several unique accomplishments.

• The Lifetime Achievement Award, SOHO's highest and rarely-given honor, was bestowed on John D. Henderson, FAIA, a devoted preservation architect who has spent nearly 40 years restoring and rehabilitating San Diego's crowning historic icons as a full-time professional and a volunteer. This honor is especially fitting during SOHO's 50th anniversary celebration because Henderson helped launch the group. He was also at the forefront of the Gaslamp Quarter renaissance, helped to write the California Historical Building Code, and

researched, wrote, and edited two seminal San Diego architecture guides, among many other contributions.

- Restoring historic homes can be highly rewarding and challenging. Just as Tammy Manse and A. E. Miller were about to restore and rehabilitate their 1927 Spanish Colonial Revival style home inside and out, fire badly damaged the property. Despite this traumatic setback, they went ahead with the removal of misguided 1980s alterations, such as a tall wall that hid the front of the house and a bay window on the canyon side. They restored key architectural features, including scalloped living-room ceiling beams that were salvaged from the fire and reworked; an arched fireplace with a terracotta hearth (both obscured by Victorian tiles); and wood-framed windows. In the canyon behind the home stands a wood cabin where the original owner, Alan Le May, wrote *The Searchers*, which became a John Wayne movie. The restored house, the cabin, and the formerly-overgrown canyon now work together to enhance Miller family life.
- The intimate Gordon M. Wells Bungalow Court, now overshadowed by new, multi-story housing near downtown San Diego, was restored outside, and transformed inside, for "the boutique urban lifestyle" by Jonathan Segal, FAIA, a San Diego architect and developer. The 280-square-foot, stand-alone cottages, which SDLofts, Segal's leasing company, bills as studio apartments, boast desirable hardwood floors, abundant windows for fresh air and natural light, and new appliances. Improved indoor-outdoor connections expand the compact living space with new French doors to private patios, and fresh landscaping. SOHO commends Segal for preserving an example of popular San Diego housing history, and foregoing new, high-density architecture where it would have been permitted.
- The University of California at San Diego, founded in 1960, now has an important campus survey and evaluation of its architecture, landscape architecture, and cultural resources. The work of Architectural Resources Group of Los Angeles, Neu Campus Planning, Paul V. Turner, and UCSD Campus Planning will aid and inform the growing university in protecting and preserving its significant buildings and features, and establish its place in California architectural history. The report hails UCSD for "its extraordinary collection of intact, high-style Modern buildings and landscapes that form the backbone of its distinctive sense of place." Citing designs by some of Southern California's most esteemed Modernist architects—Irving Gill, Robert Alexander, Lloyd Ruocco, Robert Mosher, William Pereira, A. Quincy Jones, and others—the report concludes that "virtually every [architectural style and] phase of the Modern movement in San Diego ... is represented on the campus."
- Jessica Johnson of Poway has earned the Town Crier Award for imaginatively promoting historic preservation and countywide exploration on social media, in newspaper articles, and a book. She launched her website Hidden San Diego in 2010, and soon expanded to Facebook and Instagram. She writes enticingly about irreplaceable, little known, majestic, or designated historic sites and buildings, some of which were saved by SOHO. Johnson provides her own arresting photographs to illustrate her enthusiastic narratives and intriguing posts. She has turned the internet into an entertaining and informative preservation tool available to all.
- Four 13-year-old members of Girl Scout Junior Troop #6786 of Lemon Grove and Spring Valley received the Stewardship Award. They are among the youngest of more than 400 *People In Preservation* honorees selected over 37 years. Working with co-winners, the Lemon Grove Historical Society (LGHS), they spent more than 300 hours repairing, restoring and re-stuccoing in vintage style two circa 1912 pillars that mark Lemon Grove's first mod-(Continued on the Next Page)

ern subdivision. Scouts Lianne Alforque, Danika Cuellar, Cher Flores, and Jordyn Gresham completed this strenuous, gritty Heritage Project in 2018, the centennial year of the San Diego County Girl Scouts.

With troop leader Courtney Cuellar, and historical assistance from the Lemon Grove Historical Society, especially Helen Ofield, LGHS president (see photo to the right; Ofield is center, just left of the pillar; photo by Sandé Lollis, courtesy of SOHO), the young preservationists worked on the restoration project and completed it. At the time of receiving the *PIP* award, the Junior Girl Scout troop members had already been honored with County Girl Scout Silver Awards and saluted by Lemon Grove's mayor and city council.

• Klonie Kunzel and the La Playa Trail Association were recognized with the Keeper of the Flame Award. Formed in 2005 to continue a civic project begun during the 1930s, founder and president Kunzel and members continue to promote the rich history of the La Playa area



of Point Loma in a concrete fashion. They raise funds to repair or erect monuments and plaques marking historic sites along La Playa Trail, that was first blazed by Kumeyaay Indians, then 18th-century Spanish explorers. The trail stretches from the San Diego harbor entrance to Mission San Diego de Alcalá in Mission Valley, and beyond. La Playa Trail Association has also published a pictorial history book about Point Loma.

- In addition to the Millers in Mission Hills, three more couples were honored for the outstanding restoration of their historic homes in San Diego and Del Mar. Michael and Rebecca Murphy are the third generation of Murphys to reside in their Mission Revival style home. They repaired its circa 1928 concrete foundation wall and porch roof, repainted the exterior, and restored its handsome mahogany windows. Now this Mission Hills residence is ready for more Murphys to come.
- Dr. Craig Salt and Haruko Salt returned their two-story Prairie style home in North Park to its original appearance with the help of a single black-and-white photo taken circa 1920, when the house was new. Over the years, it had suffered alterations and indignities, such as shutters added to the sleek, modern picture window; a front door from a "big box" store; and a pair of artificial stone pillars holding a gate across the driveway. Now its 28th Street façade is again as the first owners, Jesse and Dora Fleming, knew it: a spare, geometric design with a simple front porch, a second-story balcony, and a hand-crafted wooden front door resembling the original.
- In Del Mar, Barbara and Joe Harper restored and renovated their neglected, derelict Mission Revival style home. Sited on a large lot, the 1927 house might have been demolished and replaced with two or three new homes by a different owner. Its design represents the sophisticated yet simple elegance of the 1920s, when Del Mar was the playground of Hollywood stars and wealthy families. SOHO applauds the Harpers for investing heart, soul, and treasure in this charming historic home that will be admired and appreciated for many years to come.
- The Wilkinson Block, a prominent two-story, Mission Revival style building in Normal Heights, was restored practically brick by brick and window by window by owner, SRM Urban. Built between 1926 and 1929, this Adams Avenue building houses apartments with generous windows above several street-level storefronts showcased by large plate-glass windows. Although the intact building was designated a City of San Diego historic resource, a previous owner unfortunately removed the original wood-framed windows. SRM had them rebuilt and all the bricks were repointed. In addition, a city-required seismic retrofit secured this landmark for the future.

SOHO's *People In Preservation* awards ceremony was held on Thursday evening, May 30, in the historic Marston House formal garden, 3525 Seventh Avenue, San Diego. The reception featured hors d'oeuvres and a wine and beer open bar. The gardens were filled with enthusiatic people who support local history and preservation, and were in attendance to honor the like-minded awardees.
