How the Congress of History Began, and How it Still Serves CoH Members Today

The Congress of History of San Diego and Imperial Counties (CoH) began in 1964 when Dr. Ray Brandes, then director of the Serra Museum, located on Presidio Hill, San Diego, invited several local historians, and other history-minded men, to meet to discuss an idea of collaboration.

From that meeting the Associated Historical Groups of San Diego County was developed, based on the concept of historical groups working together for the benefit of all.

The motto of *Unity and Joint Effort* was adopted, and it continues to be the Congress of History's motto, up to the present time.

From the very beginning the Congress of History did not have a "brick and mortar" office/location, and it still does not, today. It is a networking organization that draws together delegates from the history museums, historical societies, and archival groups throughout San Diego, Imperial, and Riverside Counties, and the upper Baja, Mexico. The CoH also welcomes individual memberships from any region.

We are a 501(C)(3) non-profit. The board members of the CoH are all volunteers; there is no paid staff. Regular board meetings are held throughout the year.

These meetings are often held at the site of one of our member organizations. There is a tour of the historic site, or museum, following the meeting. Board meetings are open to members and the public.

You are invited to become an organizational or individual member of the Congress of History. A membership form is on the last page of this *Adelante*.

Organizational Members —

Our organizational members are the backbone of this networking group; each organization has an official delegate to the Congress of History.

Individual Members —

20th century, was persistently defined by a spirit of female courage, perseverance, and loud mobilization, including marches on Washington, D.C. (as illustrated in the program cover artwork, above). The vote was not easily won, but their perseverance finally paid off in 1920.

As important as this ratification victory was, we're offering this conference *primarily* to celebrate our local women, who also made history by breaking down barriers and creating legacies in our own region. It is especially to these women that we say a heartfelt "thank you" for the many battles they fought to gain the rights that women hold dear today. They blazed the trails that we will continue to follow, into the future. Thank you for being here to celebrate with us these women's accomplishments! ...

located in Balboa Park's Palisades area, at 2168 Pan American Road East. Free parking is available in near-by parking lots.

Saturday, March 21, 9 a.m. to 11 a.m. *El Jardín del Rey, "Garden of the Dead,"* the *Grotto at Presidio Hill Park* Located on a grassy terrace in Presidio Park's westernmost corner, the grotto is adjacent to a Presidio Park utility building just off Taylor Street and Presidio Drive, at the base of Presidio Hill.

This is a largely-forgotten area known as the "Franciscan Gardens." Dedicated on July 16, 1935 as *El Jardín del Rey*, The King's Garden, it was where members of the Sacred Expedition, including Father Junípero Serra, gathered on July 1, 1769. The grotto area contains several important, if forgotten, historic sites associated with Spain's contributions to San Diego's founding between 1769 and 1774.

Various historic sites on the walk include the "Spanish Camp," where the four divisions of the Sacred Expedition gathered to plan the placement of military forts and religious missions at San Diego and Monterey. The area also contains the site of a corral, where the first domesticated horses, mules, and cattle brought into California were held. Tour guide Alexander D. Bevil will point-out and discuss these forgotten historic sites.

While street parking is limited, there is free parking just up Presidio Drive near the Serra Cross. There is also free Saturday parking at the Caltrans Building three blocks to the southwest at Taylor and Juan Streets.

NOTE: Do NOT park at the Presidio Recreation Center's parking lot, as it is a tow-away zone.

Please wear comfortable shoes and appropriate clothing for walking in rain, wind, or sunshine.

Curran (who owned and lived-in the Fountain House Hotel in Murrieta from 1900 to 1999 and knew a few things about Murrieta from her time working at the Murrieta Hot Springs and later working at the post office.)

Elling and Johnson are two in a troupe of actors in the *Notable Men and Women of Temecula* who bring beloved, historic people of the area back to life through their performances, delighting and educating their audiences and giving people of today a chance to speak with these characters from the past.

This free event is open to the public. One basic theme is selected for each conference by the Board of Directors. Conference themes primarily cover local, Southern California history, with a strong emphasis on San Diego, Imperial, and Riverside Counties, with the Northern Baja, Mexico, included.

Within the two-day conference the speakers' topics often follow somewhat of a timeline from the oldest history on Friday (ie: local, Native American history) up to the most current on Saturday (ie: airplanes, computers, space travel, etc.). This is not always possible to accomplish, completely (because of when speakers are able to attend) but we attempt to follow this approximate timeline.

Click on "quick view" to see how many spaces are left on that tour. Add the tour time you choose to your "shopping cart," then "check out" (it's free and there are no fees). Bring your tour confirmation with you. Arrive at least 15 minutes before your tour time to check-in with the city's Park & Recreation staff in the museum's backyard. While at the museum, be sure to visit the FOVM booth for more information.

Walk-ups will be accepted the day of the event, after registered guests, if there is room on the tour.

My memory of the conference held in the year 1991, and prior to that, is really lacking because I first became involved in the Congress of History (CoH) in 1992, after I received an Award of Honor in March of that year, at the CoH Conference (The History of Religion) held in Lakeside. I received that award for co-founding the Lemon Grove Historical Society and the Art Deco Society of San Diego (ADSSD is now defunct), and fighting to save Egyptian Revival Art Deco buildings, and historic neon signs, in San Diego County. Before I was tapped for that award, I didn't even know that the Congress of History existed!

After that, I learned more about the organization, became the delegate of the Lemon Grove Historical Society to the CoH, and started attending the CoH board meetings. Then, with my training and experience as a professional journalist and graphic artist, I offered to edit the CoH newsletter, *Adelante*, on my computer. Karna Webster was the CoH president at that time (1992). Prior to my offer, she had been writing and typing the four-page newsletter, Adelante. (She gladly turned-over that job to me.) She continued as CoH president through 1994, then from 1995 through 1998 I was president. Other wonderful folks followed me as president. I have continued writing/editing/creating/mailing *Adelante* for 28 years (with the assistance of many other members, along the way).

I've also been the conference chair several times, in the past. The first conference on which I worked, with Roxana Phillips, was our 29th Annual Convention – "The Essential Earth: Our Adobe Heritage in San Diego County (1994) that was held at the Wildwood Community Center, Vista, and co-sponsored by the Vista Historical Society. I illustrated the cover of that conference program with an ink sketch of an old adobe wall. After several years of conference experience, I wrote/designed the 30-page "ABCs for Planning and Creating the Annual Congress of History Conference," which I've updated over the years.

Having observed and volunteered-for the Congress of History for so many years, I've come to appreciate that this all-volunteer organization is important for this region because we help to keep the local history community in communication with each other, in many ways – at our regular meetings, by our newsletter *Adelante*, and by our Annual History Conference. 
Geoglyphs of the Desert Southwest to be presented by Author Anne Morgan, at the S. D. Archaeological Center, in Escondido, on Fri., Mar. 27 at 7 p.m.

A FREE program on *Geoglyphs of the Desert Southwest: Earthen Art as Viewed from Above* will be presented by author Anne Morgan, offered by the **San Diego Archaeological Center** (SDAC) on Friday, March 27 at 7 p.m. in

The deserts of the American southwest contain one of the largest concentrations of geoglyphs outside of Peru's Nazca Lines (see photo, below). These ancient Native American works of earthen art can be up to hundreds of feet long, and yet are often invisible until viewed from above.

Before there were drones, GPS, or Google Maps, photographer Harry Casey began a unique archaeology project. Armed with nothing more than topographic maps, 35mm film cameras, and his beloved Piper J3 Cub aircraft, Casey spent 35 years (Continued at the Top of the Next Page)

documenting the region's geoglyphs before natural erosion and human intervention could destroy these fragile sites. 
of these beautiful and mysterious features. A book signing will take place after the lecture.





Romance of the Rancho is the theme for the 9th Annual San Diego Adobe Home Tour. The 2020 tour celebrates the rich Spanish-Mexican rancho heritage by opening the doors to four beautiful adobe homes and properties in Rancho Santa Fe and Escondido. The tour will showcase the 1831-built Osuna adobe ranch. It also features the home and gardens of a 1926-built home overlooking Lake Hodges that was featured in the October 2019 edition of San Diego Home/Garden. Adobe haciendas and ranch houses sprinkled throughout the rolling hills of North San Diego County serve as enduring reminders of the region's Spanish-Mexican rancho heritage. The 9th Annual San Diego



Much of our local adobe rancho history has crumbled into ruins. However, this was a trend that changed course at the turn of the 20th century, when gentlemen farmers looking to escape urban life moved into the area to plant citrus groves in Escondido and develop equestrian facilities in Rancho Santa Fe.

With a renewed interest in a simple life where handicraft and living close to nature was emphasized, landowners and their architects restored abandoned adobe structures and built new hacienda-style and Spanish Revival homes using bricks of native adobe mud.

March 22 Tour to showcase 1831 Osuna Adobe

This year's tour showcases the 1831-built Osuna adobe, situated on the old Mexican Rancho San Dieguito land grant, near what is today the village of Rancho Santa Fe. In 1924, a wealthy business

owner, seeking to breed Kentucky racehorses, commissioned architect Lillian Rice to oversee the restoration and rehabilitation of the old adobe home. The property today is a horse-boarding and -training facility; This tour offers an opportunity to view the house (which is rarely open to the public) within a working horse ranch. Further along on the Del Dios Highway linking Rancho Santa Fe and Escondido, Louis M. Richard, geologist for Gladding McBean and Company, built a ranch house for himself and his family in 1926. (See the Mexican-style patio with fountain, right. Photo by Don Bartletti.)

The "beautiful Spanish home" with a view overlooking Lake Hodges features an adobe-and-stucco structure blending Mexican-patio rancho and Spanish Revival styles, hidden behind extensive gardens reflecting the changing moods and lighting of each passing day. The popularity of adobe ranch homes enjoyed another revival in the 1950s, though smaller in scale and in urban and suburban settings.

The romance of these adobe homes is represented by the use of rough-cut beams, tile roofs, practical floorplans, and commanding views.



In Escondido, the tour will feature a 1958 adobe ranch-style hacienda built by Weir Bros. Adobe Company. For several decades, this expansive family home functioned as a place for community fundraising and entertainment. The current owners have decorated with Mexican and Spanish folk art and a bright Mexican palette that evokes an earlier time.

Nearing the end of this midcentury era of adobe construction, a local dentist designed and built an adobe in Escondido as an investment property. The sprawling hacienda-style house was built in 1982, with numerous fireplaces and post-modern construction, while incorporating the classic features of the traditional ranch style home.

The Osuna Ranch and the three homes on this *9th Annual Adobe Home Tour* represent the entire spectrum of San Diego County's adobe heritage. Tickets are available *NOW*, online, at: http://adobehometour.com. (See more tour details at the bottom of this page.)

The Story of Modern Adobe Construction

Modern adobe construction wasn't rare in San Diego's North County, but it also wasn't common – until a revival in the late 1940s. In the mid-20th century, it became so popular in the region that today the Escondido area has the highest concentration of adobe homes and structures anywhere in the country outside of New Mexico.

Given the thermal properties of thick adobe wall construction, which allows for less use of energy for cooling and heating, adobe builders were

creating environmentally friendly "green" homes well before there was a call for such a thing. Many of the homes were built with bricks made on-site, reducing the need for shipping.

In the early 1980s, the state of California made significant changes to building codes – most notably seismic restrictions – which slowed the adobe building boom. As a result, though homes have been built featuring non-structural adobe brick facades, the era of true adobe home construction came to an end. Because adobe houses will never be built on a large scale again in California, the collection of existing homes across San Diego's North County is a finite treasure that requires the stewardship of people willing to maintain these now-irreplaceable structures, according to the San Diego Adobe Heritage Association.

The *Adobe Home Tour* is a volunteer effort of that association, whose mission is to inspire the appreciation and understanding of adobe heritage in San Diego County. From its earliest days, settlers of southwestern California have appreciated the practical and aesthetic values of adobe home construction, and today's adobe aficionados across San Diego County are eager to grow awareness of the uniqueness of these architecturally significant structures. The San Diego Adobe Heritage Association maintains a website which serves as a resource for homeowners looking to remodel, restore or maintain their adobe home, or for anyone with an interest in adobe construction.

SAVE THE DATES – Looking for a fun way to celebrate the Easter holiday with your friends and family? Look no further than the **Pacific Southwest Railway Museum** (PSRM), in Campo. Complete with a train ride, a visit from the Easter Bunny, and an Easter egg hunt, the *Easter Bunny Train* event at the museum is per-

fect for the whole family. These special trains will run Saturday and Sunday, April 4 & 5, and Saturday, April 12. (The usual Golden State Trains will run on Easter Sunday, April 21, but **no** Bunny Trains that day.)

The *Easter Bunny Trains* will run at 11 a.m., 1:15 p.m., and 3 p.m. Any unforeseen modifications to the hours will be posted on the home page of the PSRM website (**www.psrm.org**).

Tickets are available for sale NOW for the *Bunny Trains*, and associated events. Those tickets can be purchased in-person the day of the event, at the Campo Depot (<u>subject to space availability</u>), or online at the PSRM website: **www.psrm.org**. Note: Advance reservations are <u>not</u> required for this event. (See listing of ticket fares, below.)

The celebration kicks-off with a train ride. The Easter Bunny will board the train at the Campo Depot and visit with all of the passengers on the train as it travels through San Diego's beautiful east-county mountains. After enjoying the one-hour journey along 12 miles of track, the train stops at the museum's Display Building where more fun awaits.

Within the Display Building two Easter egg hunting areas will be open for the children. One is geared towards the smallest travelers, with eggs in plain sight; the other takes-up the entire Display Building, with the eggs carefully hidden by the Easter Bunny. The children may turn-in the plastic eggs they find to museum volunteers for sweets, and other prizes. The best part – entrance into the Display Building, and either of the Easter egg hunts, are included in the price of your train tickets!

Locomotive Cab Rides

Locomotive Cab Rides are also offered, at \$40 per person, for one or two persons, ages 6 and up. (Persons under age six are allowed to ride in the train, but **not** in the locomotive.) This is your opportunity to ride in the locomotive cab with the engineer and the crew during the round-trip. During the ride, you'll get to experience what railroading is like from the cab of the locomotive! Cab riders under the age of eighteen (18) must be accompanied by another paid cab rider *over* the age of eighteen (18) at all times when riding in the cab.

The cost of the cab ride also includes the train ride, for a to-

tal of \$40 round-trip for every person riding in the locomotive <u>regardless of age</u> (<u>only two persons at a time</u>). PSRM does allow sharing, whereby one person rides in the cab and another on the train, during the outward-bound trip, then they switch positions for the return trip. Only two riders are allowed in the cab at one time. (For more options, or to reserve your cab ride, see the "Locomotive Cab Rides" page in their website.) Note: **Dress warmly**, in layers. Children tend to be especially sensitive to the loud air horn on the locomotive, so PSRM does have ear protection available when a child (ages 6 and up) is riding in the cab. Also, depending on which locomotive they're using, you may be required to stand for the entire trip. Closed-toed shoes are required for those riding in locomotive cabs.

Californian won her first America's Schooner Cup March 30, 2019. Raymond Ashley, Ph.D., K.C.I., President/CEO of the **Maritime Museum of San Diego** says about the *Californian*, "More than any other type of vessel, the schooner has migrated from the pages of history and into the world of legend, art, and poetry that we all claim as part of our culture." *Californian*, built from the ground up at Spanish Landing in San Diego in 1984, is a replica of the 1847 Revenue Cutter *C.W. Lawrence*, which patrolled the coast of California enforcing federal law during the gold rush and able to chase after tall ships making their way to San Francisco to skirt tariffs. Designed for speed, *Californian* has seven sails, carries 7,000 square feet of canvas, and is armed with four six-pound deck guns.







CA Governor's Historic Preservation Award Nominations Sought; Deadline is <u>Tues.</u>, <u>April 14</u>

Every spring since 1986, the California Office of Historic Preservation (OHP) has solicited nominations for the Governor's Historic Preservation awards for achievements in preserving the heritage of California. Recipients of this year's awards will be announced at the State Historical Resources Commission's fall meeting. Presentation of the awards will take place in Sacramento in mid-November of 2020

California's history is embodied in buildings, structures, sites, and objects that provide a tangible link to the people, events, and patterns of history that have shaped California's growth and development. Since 1986, more than two hundred organizations, groups, and agencies have been recognized for their outstanding commitment to preserving those connections to California's cultural and architectural legacies.

ELIGIBILITY: • Any individual, group, firm, organization, or local, state, or federal agency involved in historic preservation is eligible to be nominated for a Governor's Historic Preservation Award. You may <u>not</u> nominate yourself.

- Public agencies submitting applications shall clearly demonstrate how the project or activity submitted is distinguished from a project or activity which would normally fall within its mandate to execute.
 - Firms submitting projects shall clearly demonstrate involvement beyond contractual scope.
- Nominees shall have completed the project or activity (or a substantial portion of a large-scale, phased project) within the last three years. For more specific requirements, see the website: www.ohp.parks.ca.gov.

Note: Please use ONLY the 2020 nomination forms, as nomination requirements and forms have been updated and revised. DEADLINE: Nominations must be postmarked (or hand-delivered by 5 p.m.) on or before Tuesday, April 14, 2020. Important: Specific requirements apply to different portions of the nomination submitted. 


